Details of document:

Package intercepted at Boston Harbor Hotel on 03/07/15 by Agents unMadeMan Inigo and Rhino. Report created by Winston Chandler [Subject #SQ792K] for unidentified client.

Report contains intel on whereabouts of Rosenberg Clinic personnel in aftermath of fire at facility on 06/16/14.

Overview of the report:

The following staff members of the clinic are named:

Nathalie Lacoste [Subject #LI2B1E] was found dead on 07/05/14 near Boucherville, QC, Canada. Her murder case remains open.

Adam Rosenberg [Subject #LI6R5L], Vanessa Baup [Subject #LI9S2W] and Maryse McDuff [Subject #LI4L50] remain missing.

Ken Rhodes [Subject #LI1L1Y], Mae Edwards [Subject #LI0X7Q] and James Nguyen [Subject #LI5R1U] were all questioned and provided little important intel on the whereabouts of the missing staff.

The fire on 06/16/14 appears to have been chemical in nature, and was started in the back of the clinic facility, possibly in the lab of Rosenberg himself.

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Rosenberg Clinic Staff Report

March 1, 2015



At 11:45AM on June 16, 2014, smoke was reported in the corridors of the Royal Victoria Hospital on Montreal. The building was evacuated, emergency response was swift and no injuries were reported at the time. The fire was said to have started within a lab of the Rosenberg Clinic, and spread quickly throughout the facility. All 9 staff members were present on the day of the fire, however none have since returned to the former site of the clinic.

Since the fire, I have been able to track down 4 of the 9 employees. The first was Dr. Lacoste, found dead by police on July 5th, 2014 on the outskirts of Boucherville, QC. The police report indicates she had died of blunt force trauma days before she was found. At this time, her murder case remains opens.

I tracked two of the newer doctors at the clinic, Ken Rhodes and Mae Edwards, both of whom still live and work in Montreal. Dr. Rhodes now works as a medical researcher at McGill University. I spoke with him briefly on the phone on November 15th, 2014. He claimed to have newly arrived at the Rosenberg clinic just weeks before the fire. Pressing further yielded no significant answers, yet Dr. Rhodes seemed open to my questions and concerned with the well being of his former co-workers. On January 22nd, I met with Dr. Edwards in person at a cafe near Montreal General, the hospital where she now works.

After I explained that I had been assigned to gather information about the Rosenberg fire, Dr. Edwards expressed concern for her co-workers, and enquired after them. She has stayed in touch with Dr. Rhodes, explaining to me that they had both started at the clinic at the same time and were both recent immigrants to Montreal - before starting with Rosenberg. Dr. Rhodes was working at the MedStar Washington Hospital Center in Washington DC and Dr. Edwards at Legacy Good Samaritan Medical Center in Portland, OR. When asked about the events of June 16th, Dr. Edwards described a scene of both panic and quick response. According to Dr. Edwards, the fire started in the main laboratory and quickly spread to the offices and other facilities. The aides reacted quickly, first helping the patients in both the lab and the waiting area, before returning to ensure the safety of the doctors. When pressed for details, Dr. Edwards said she did not see much of what happened next due to the thick black smoke. Once outside of the clinic, medical personnel helped her. Besides Dr. Rhodes, she has not seen or heard from any of the staff since. I left Dr. Edwards with my contact information should she remember any further details. She has not yet contacted me.

More recently, I was able to track down a fourth member of the staff, James Nguyen, in Albany, NY. Nguyen was a medical assistant at the clinic, and one of the aides Dr. Edwards



witnessed helping the patients during the fire. On February 21st, I was able to interview Nguyen about the incident, at a bar in downtown Albany.

He was cautious about my questioning in the beginning, but relaxed eventually. He told me that he had been working at Rosenberg for only a month before the fire, and that he did not know much about the research being performed at the clinic. He worked mainly in the front office and reception area, and dealt more with patients than the doctors themselves. On the morning of the fire, he was at the front desk when he first saw the smoke. He recounted seeing another assistant run out of one of the labs immediately, followed by Dr. Rosenberg. He then told the patients in the waiting area to flee, and helped one of them out the doors of the clinic to emergency personnel outside. Returning back into the building to help others, Nguyen says he saw only a wall of black smoke. Calling out, he found Dr. McDuff and quickly brought her to safety. He attempted to re-enter the facility again, but by this time the fire had spread and he remained outside. When asked about his quick response, he quickly brushed me off, saying he simply did what he could.

According to two of the firsthand accounts, the fire began in the back of the clinic, likely in the laboratory of Dr. Rosenberg. The black smoke suggests that the fire was chemical in origin. The quick response of all the clinic staff suggests they may have prepared for the possibility of a fire beforehand. Research into the fire procedures of Royal Victoria Hospital, and similar facilities suggests this is standard practice, due to the flammable nature of research materials and medical supplies. However, the media reports of the incident mention only limited amount of smoke from an overheated piece of lab equipment. I contacted the Royal Victoria Hospital administration regarding the discrepancy, and received a curt response claiming there had been a mistake in the press release.

There are no reports of injury during the fire. None of the clinic's patients seemed to be harmed in the incident. The members of the clinic staff I was able to locate were all new arrivals, and none of the core researchers have surfaced. The whereabouts of Dr. Rosenberg are similarly unknown at this time.
